GENERAL COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Learn practical introductory skills in white water rafting and operations for professional outfitters or for personal trips. This is the first step to professional raft guide certification. Adventurous, water minded people will develop pre-trip and on-water basic guiding skills. We will explore the upper glacier fed waters of the Kicking Horse River and other Rocky Mountain rivers around Golden, BC.

Program Information: This course is an elective course of the ATBO Program. When this course is taken in conjunction with ATBO 230 Swift Water Rescue, and ATBO 235 Raft Guide Skills Level 2, it can lead to professional certification as a white water raft guide with the BCROA (BC River Outfitters Association).

 - maneuver the raft in up to class 2-3 water, using oar and paddle strokes.

- River terminology, river hazards, and hydrodynamics
- River safety skills
- River safety briefings
- Raft handling – by oar and by paddle
- Raft handling in white water

- Map reading, and outdoor skills
- Knots, and rope rescue
- Commercial operations
